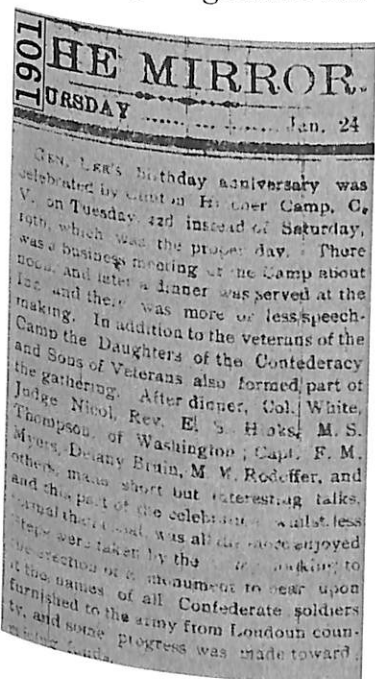


The Story of "Loudoun's Silent Sentinel" Unfolded

It all started back on January 22, 1901, at a business meeting with the Clinton Hatcher Camp Confederate Veterans & Sons and the Loudoun Chapter Daughters of the Confederacy. They were celebrating General Lee's Birthday by having a luncheon meeting at The Inn in Leesburg, Virginia. It was at this very meeting that the topic of erecting a monument to the Confederate Veterans was first noted. "The Mirror" reports on 24 January 1901:



Steps were taken by the Camp looking to the erection of a monument to bear upon it the names of all Confederate soldiers furnished to the army from Loudoun County and some progress was made toward raising funds.

Much like governmental procedures today, permissions had to be granted before monuments could be erected on government property. By October 31, 1901, the Loudoun Chapter Daughters of the Confederacy had obtained approval

for the erection of a monument on the Loudoun County Courthouse lawn in Leesburg. Minutes from the Board of Supervisors report:

Present: T.B. James Chairman; W. D. Thompson;

George Frasier; Jno. J. Crim; Jno. F. Adams;

M. H. Whitman - Ordered that permission be and the same is hereby granted to the Daughters of the Confederacy to erect a Monument to the memory of the Confederate dead in the South West corner of the Courthouse yard in Leesburg, Va.

Between the period of October 31, 1901, and June 1906 very few records have been found to date as to the efforts for the monument. It was in July 1906 that the Minutes from the Board of Supervisors reported:

Be it resolved that there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$500.00 [to] be used in assisting the Clinton Hatcher Camp of Confederate Veterans of Loudoun County, the Sons & Daughters of the Confederacy of said County in saving for the erection of a monument to the memory of the Confederate Soldiers of Loudoun County who served in the Confederate Army.

.....this money shall be available only on the condition that the Clinton Hatcher Camp of Confederate Veterans, the Sons & Daughters of the Confederacy of Loudoun County shall (?) fifteen months from the first day of August 1906 secure in cash twenty five hundred dollars exclusive of said sum hereby appropriated for the erection of said monument.

What this tells us is that the estimated cost of the bronze monument was at least \$3,000. That of course was quite a sum of money back in the early 1900s. There were two known fund-raisers to help meet this goal, the first being a baby contest, held by the ladies and the second was a booklet written and donated by a local hero, Col. Elijah V. White. Col. White, who was a prime figure in this movement for the erection of such a gift to Loudoun County, wrote the history of the battle of Ball's Bluff. This he had printed in booklet form and presented 500 copies to the members of Loudoun Chapter UDC to be sold for the erection of the monument.

The final entry in the Board of Supervisor's January 1907 Minutes read:

It was on motion ordered that whereas heretofore to wit on February 19, 1901, the Legislature of Virginia on the Courthouse square, (see Extra Session Acts page 100) upon which to erect a monument to the memory of the Confederate Soldiers of Loudoun County who served in the Confederate army during the Civil War of 1861-1865 and erection of said monument in charge and the said Board of Supervisors being so as aforesaid empowered do hereby set apart and designate the following site for the purposed of aforesaid to wit on the main walk leading from West front of the courthouse to King Street.

With the issues of the monument's location and fund-raising underway, the next task of selecting a sculptor was probably quite an arduous one. Unfortunately, how the Daughters found the sculptor is unknown, but we can say how fortunate this county is for their selection of renowned sculptor Frederick William Sievers.

The Richmond Times-Dispatch reported June 14, 1970:

The Confederate monument in front of the courthouse in Leesburg is the work of the late F. William Sievers (died in 1966), Richmond sculptor, whose work was chosen over 35 other models submitted to the Virginia State Commission. The statue attracts much interest from tourists and is a popular camera subject.

Siever's work was unknown during the early years of the 1900s. It is believed that the Leesburg monument was most likely Sievers' second public commissioned sculpture, the first being from Abingdon in 1906. The soldier sculptures are very similar but have a few defining differences. The overall stance and cocking gun are similar, but the Leesburg soldier's hat is turned up on the brim, he has a CSA buckle vs. a two-piece Confederate buckle and is carrying a blanket roll across his chest.

Sievers was born on October 26, 1872, in Fort Wayne, Indiana. As a boy he was taken to Atlanta, Georgia, and was educated there in public schools. His father, Frederick Augustus Ferdinand Sievers, was

an employee of Singer Sewing Machines. In 1892 the central office of Singer moved to Richmond and his father moved with them. Shortly thereafter, the Carvers, by whom Sievers was employed, moved to New York, and Sievers followed.

At the age of 21, Frederick William Sievers moved to Richmond and secured a job with Frank Brothers, gilders and ornamental picture frame makers. In the evening he attended the Virginia Mechanics Institute. This is where his love for sculpting began. He knew there was no future in frame making so he starved himself in order to save for a trip to study in Europe.

In Rome, at the Royal Academy, Sievers was required to take the Italian examinations in drawing, modeling, perspective, geometry and architecture. He was so proficient that he was soon placed in the Academy's highest class and with a mark of 100 percent received first prize from the Academy. All the emphasis at that time was on realism in sculpture and consequently one of the courses was in anatomy. "Instructors in anatomy, who were always specialists, would take a corpse and skin it, showing where the muscles were attached and how they affected the skin surface" said Sievers. He was always proud to be classified as a "naturalist" in art. His first studio was in Rome between 1899 and 1901. Sievers also attended the Academie Julian in Paris.

In September 1902 he returned to Atlanta, and later moved to New York. The sculptor had a studio in New York between 1905 and 1910. In 1906, Sievers married Elsie Muegge. He was married to her for 56 years and fathered two children, Lillian Gladys and William Daniel.

Sievers' first commission to do a public monument came from Abingdon in 1906. In 1907, Sievers was commissioned to do yet another Confederate soldier for Loudoun Chapter Daughters of the Confederacy in Leesburg.

In 1910, the Virginia State Commission chose Sievers over 36 sculptors who submitted models for the Virginia Memorial at Gettysburg. The monument was completed in 1917. Having stated that he would settle in the place where his first major commission was received, Sievers and his family moved to Forest Hill in Richmond. He set up a studio on 43d Street in Forest Hill.

His home in Richmond still stands today (below) and tours of his home and work are available. Sievers went on to sculpt many other great works of art.

Some of his works include:

- Confederate Soldier — Abingdon 1906
- Confederate Soldier — Leesburg Courthouse, Leesburg 1907
- The Virginia Monument — Gettysburg, Pennsylvania - Dedicated on June 8, 1917
- General "Stonewall" Jackson — Monument Avenue, Richmond. Dedicated October 11, 1919
- General Robert E. Lee — Gettysburg, Pennsylvania.
- Matthew Fontaine Maury — Monument Avenue, Richmond. Dedicated November 11, 1929
- General Lloyd Tilghman — Vicksburg, Mississippi
- Bust of James Madison — Virginia State Capitol Rotunda, Richmond
- Bust of Matthew Fontaine Maury in The Hall of Fame — New York
- Bust of Patrick Henry — Old Hall House of Delegates
- Bust of Zachary Taylor — Virginia State Capitol Rotunda, Richmond

On August 22, 1907, Sievers obtained a copyright for his work of the Leesburg Monument. It was issued with the following description:

Confederate Infantryman standing in act of cocking musket is that of a "beardless" young man in complete Confederate costume. He stands with left foot forward, with weight of body equally divided over each leg.

The actual day of the completion of the Leesburg monument is unknown; however many folks remembered for years what it was like in Leesburg on the unveiling day of May 28, 1908.

The Loudoun Mirror wrote in June 1908: (Condensed)
Two thousand yards of red & white bunting was used



in decorating the businesses and many private residences and the old town wore

her holiday attire in honor of the occasion. Early in the morning the people began to pour in, coming from every direction and by eleven o'clock there were fully 6,000 strangers in Leesburg, and the good order throughout the day was an honor to the citizens of Loudoun County.

.....Even the intense heat failed to dampen the ardor of the large and enthusiastic assemblage.

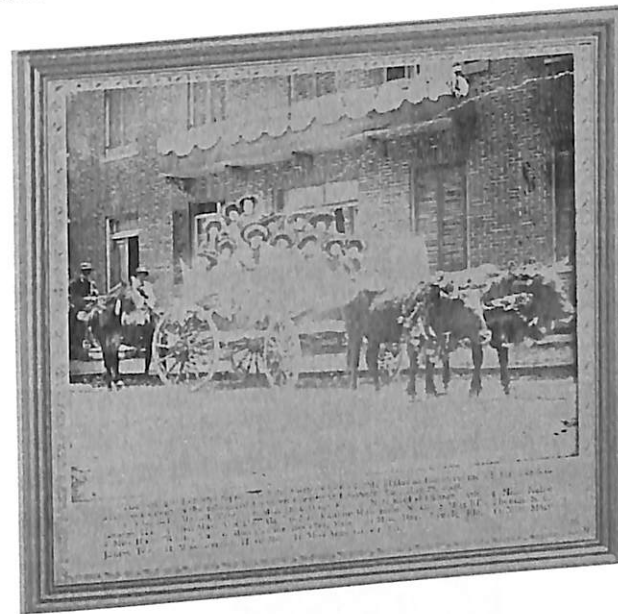
.....An interesting and beautiful feature of the day was the float representing the thirteen states, drawn by a team of oxen. The young ladies composing this "dream of loveliness" in their white and red costumes of the

style of many years ago and the state they represented are as follows:

Virginia-Miss Hazelle White, of Leesburg; North Carolina - Miss Pauline Hutchison of Ashburn; South Carolina-Miss Ellis Thomas of Aldie; Texas-Miss Mary James of Round Hill; Tennessee-Miss Arabella McGill of Leesburg; Kentucky - Miss Etta Wise of Leesburg; Florida- Miss Mary Lynch of Round Hill; Alabama-Miss Mary McCabe of Leesburg; Louisiana-Miss Anne Gibson of Aldie; Mississippi-Miss Pauline Rodeffer of Lovettsville; Missouri-Miss Gertrude Hess of Hamilton; Arkansas- Miss Rachel Palmer of Aldie; Georgia-Miss Nellie George of Lovettsville.

The exercises began at 10 o'clock, the first move being the escort to meet the distinguished speakers on the 10:10 train. Headed by the Bluemont Band, which furnished music throughout the day.

After singing and the formal presentation of the States to the Speakers, Crosses of Honor were presented by Mrs. Murray Pres. Loudoun Chapter Daughters of the Confederacy, to the following veterans:
C.W. Barton; Joseph F. Fleming, Private; Lewis J. French, Private; C. G. Giddings, Lieut.; John Herndon,

Mr. Harrison's Remarks and Poem

Ladies and Gentlemen: I appreciate very deeply the honor conferred upon me in being asked to write a few verses to commemorate the unveiling of this beautiful monument, the work of our womens' hands, a gift from them to the Confederate soldiers of Loudoun County. I would that I had the power, the gift, to impart to my word, picture all that I feel- that I could say all that I long to say in honor of that soldier who fought, who bled, who died for the cause he loved so well, that nation who gave him birth, who to him was a veritable mother, a mother of countless heroes.

A STATUE, proof of thy maker's art, bronze cast;
In days to come, a monument to ages that have past;
Today to us who gather here,
You are that some one our hearts hold dear,
That father, brother, husband, lover,
At peace with God, beneath the sod;
Who heard the call; who walked the way;
That Soldier of Right who wore the gray.

A STATUE, mutely telling the sad story
Of a nation that died 'midst a halo of glory;
Of shatter'd hopes; ambitions dead;
Of noble blood that was freely shed;
Of the bugle's call, for more to fall;
Of those who went, none being sent.
Of where the fiercest waxed the fray
Was found the soldier who wore the grey.

A STATUE, linking the heavens with the Earth;
The form of that Hero to whom our nation gave
birth;
Who follow'd on where Honor led,
Till he rested with our holy dead;

To you, old soldiers, who are gathered here today, and to you, members of that loyal legion, who have crossed that river from the farther shore, of which no traveler returns to you, "soldiers who wore the gray" these verses are affectionately dedicated.

In 1965, a postcard of the Leesburg Monument was sent to Miss Lillian Sievers, daughter of Frederick William Sievers, at her address on West 42nd Street in Richmond. The writer only known as Bobby writes:

Dear Lil -

I came across this in my trunk the other day. Note the spelling. Pity such a bad photograph of so beautiful [a] work. Trust you are well and best love to you and Jessie.

What the writer of this postcard is referring to when he speaks of the spelling is the postcard maker spelled Sievers incorrectly. It is spelled on the card Sever. The actual description on the postcard sums it up very nicely:

THIS CONFEDERATE soldier, the pride of Leesburg, has stood guard over the local scene since it was unveiled in 1908. A gift of the local Daughters of the Confederacy, this bronze statue of outstanding beauty is the work of William Sever who also did the "Virginia Group" memorial at the Gettysburg Battle Field.



Roll forward 96 years to a local meeting of the Lee Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy held at the home of Anne Frazer in Hamilton on May 17, 2004. It was at this meeting that the upcoming President, Becky Fleming, brought up the poor condition of this great monument. It was voted that Fleming would spearhead this project and she was to immediately take the necessary steps to ensure that the monument would stand for another 100 years.

The process in obtaining the approvals and funds for this project was a long and arduous one and it took nearly two years to complete. The first step that was taken was to write a letter to Judge Thomas D. Horne, Circuit Court Judge of Loudoun County, requesting permission from the courthouse to restore the monument. His response, dated June 17, 2004:

Dear Ms. Fleming,

Thank you for your recent letter concerning the proposed preservation effort involving the Confederate Statue on the Courthouse lawn. This work of art has become one of the focal points of the courthouse, the Town of Leesburg, and the County of Loudoun. Like you, I have become concerned with the condition of the grounds and monuments at the courthouse. Your willingness to assist in the preservation of this historic treasure is deeply appreciated by the community.

Consistent with the desire to further the preservation tasks on the courthouse grounds, the Loudoun County Board of Supervisors created a task force along with an arts advisory committee to assist with those projects involving the courthouse grounds. I will bring your proposal to their attention immediately, so that they may be advised of your interest.

On behalf of all of us who live in Loudoun County, thank you for your interest in preserving the memory of our rich heritage. I remain,

It took 18 months of meetings with the County before the final approvals were received. During this time much documentation was given to the county, including the studies on the effects of bronze deterioration and the monument's complete history. Fleming did extensive research on the monument, including several trips to the Library of Virginia in Richmond and the Thomas Balch Library in Leesburg, and compiled news articles and personal effects in regards to the monument. In addition, found a conservator and did extensive research on bronze restoration for the County.

In December 2005, the Lee Chapter Newsletter read in part as follows:

Confederate Monument

On the evening of October 25, 2005 I attended the Loudoun Courthouse Grounds & Facilities Task Force Committee meeting. Committee member, Ms. Sharon Hodges gave an update on the responses the County had received on our monument literature & recommendations that were disbursed to the courthouse members in early October. She stated that they had only received one response which came from Ms. Judy Waddell of the General District Court. Ms. Waddell stated that she was elated that we were taking on this well needed project! At the close of this meeting a motion was made to submit to the courthouse members the committee's final approval/recommendation for this project. The motion was passed unanimously.

On November 3, 2005 the answer that had been so long awaited was received from the County and it read as follows:

Becky,

The Courts Advisory gave their nod to your efforts on educating the public and restoring the Statue. If you would forward me copies of any printed articles regarding this effort, I would be most appreciative.

Finally after 18 months of deliberations we have the absolute "go ahead" on our monument! Regrettably we will have to wait until May 2006 to start this project as the cold weather is beginning to set in. The only thing left is the public education portion of this project that is currently in the works. Hopefully we will have several articles released in the next few months.

As to the fund-raising, to date we have collected \$8,929.68 with new funding arriving daily. Nicholas Veloz has been selected to do this project.

Another interesting story was about a couple from South Riding Virginia, who were married under the monument. They contributed \$192.75. I am confident with the new articles coming out in late winter/early spring we will have enough funding to do both pieces!

The Lee Chapter's fund-raising included yard sales, food sales at August Court Days, private donations, old photograph sales and many generous donations and support from the members of Clinton Hatcher Camp, Sons of Confederate Veterans of Leesburg.

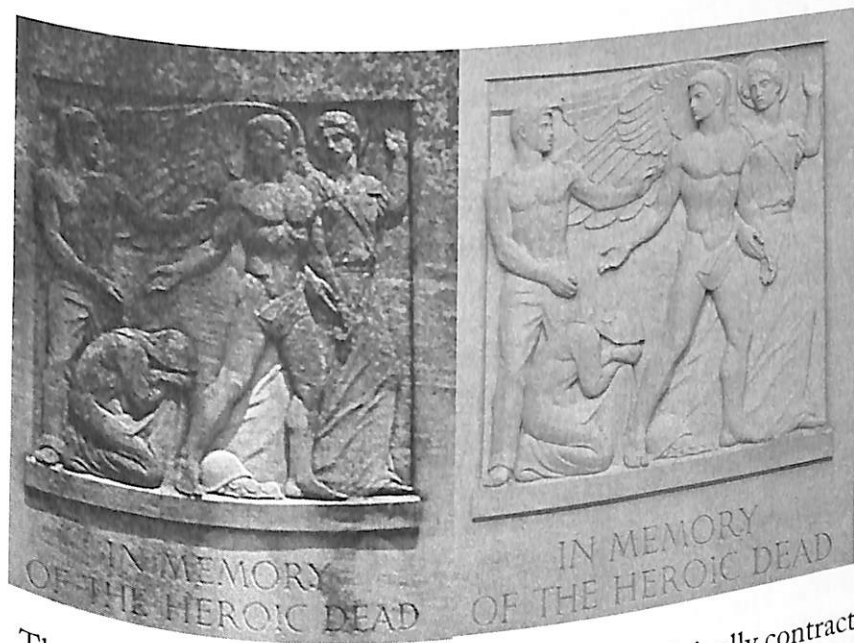
In the late fall of 2005, conservator Nicholas Veloz of Alexandria was selected by the Lee Chapter to do the (bronze portion) restoration. With final approval not being obtained from the Courthouse Grounds Committee until early winter, the Lee Chapter's restoration efforts would be put on hold until the weather broke in the late spring of 2006.

On June 17, 2006, a most anticipated day, the restoration of the monument was finally underway. Veloz used a cleaning process in which ground walnut shells were lightly sprayed onto the monument with water to remove the light green corrosion which was slowly eating through the thin layer of bronze which covers the hollow monument. A handful of the ground walnut shells used in the cleaning process was collected and stored in two old vials. One is in the possession of Becky

Fleming; the other was given to Judge Horne as a gift of appreciation for his dedication and support.

In addition to the Confederate Monument restoration, the Lee Chapter UDC also contracted Veloz to do a thorough cleaning on all the other war monuments which grace the courthouse lawn (WWI, WWII, Korea and Vietnam; and the bench seating) as these wonderful monuments had also been neglected for many years. Veloz was assisted by Kenneth Fleming (Commander of Clinton Hatcher Camp SCV) of Round Hill and the results were astonishing.

You will note the before and after photos on the Korean Monument (below).



The monument's base portion restoration was originally contracted with Neal Barnes of Neersville. Barnes removed all the old mortar from the joints, but was unable to finish the restoration. At first, the delay was due to the dry weather conditions (mortar joints were to be cleansed with rain water before new mortar was adhered) but then Barnes moved to North Carolina. Allen Cochran, a historic preservationist working in Lincoln, generously stepped forward in the summer of 2008 to complete the mortar replacement. Cochran donated both his time and material for this project and was to complete it in August 2008.

With the major portion of the restoration complete, it was then time to start thinking about the 100th Anniversary celebration and rededication, so in the early winter of 2007 a monument committee was formed. The Lee Chapter UDC Monument Committee was comprised of the following members:

- Becky Hackney Fleming of Round Hill (Loudoun native), Chapter President
- Melanie Otken Torrance of Purcellville, Chapter Vice President
- Shelly Mason Zaback of Purcellville (Loudoun native), Chapter Registrar
- Susan Thomas Crouse of Leesburg, Chapter Recording Secretary

Two years of monument restoration fund-raising took a toll on the Lee Chapter. Members asked the Loudoun County Board of Supervisors for assistance with the celebration costs. While this assistance was declined, an outpouring of support from the citizens of Loudoun funded the celebration. The Town of Leesburg moreover generously gave \$1,000 toward the costs.

The Monument Committee's objective for the rededication was to recreate as many details of the original dedication as possible. For example, in 1908 there was an oxen-drawn wagon carrying 13 young ladies representing the 13 Confederate States. Some of the replicated details included the ladies' state sashes, state flags and their red and white costumes. Although many attempts were made to locate oxen, the committee was unsuccessful and substituted them with a fine pair of mares. The driver, Nolan Barzee of Purcellville, donated his time and mares for this historic event.

Another duplicated feature was the bunting. More than 800 yards of bunting material was purchased, cut and hung by the Monument Committee. The wagon and courtyard fencing were gaily decorated with the red and white colors of the Confederacy. The commemorative "Programme" and new logo (right) was

produced by Fleming. Each program sold for \$3 and contained the history of the monument, the restoration, the names of the Loudoun Confederate soldiers, all tied with a slender red ribbon. Although the original dedication was on the 28th day of May 1908, the 100th year rededication was set for May 30, which was the following Saturday. The early morning of May 30 brought a beautiful day filled with brilliant rays of sunshine, but hours later, much to the ladies' dismay, the weather drastically changed.

The Monument Committee worked diligently throughout the morning, dressing the courtyard fencing with hundreds of yards of bunting while the Clinton Hatcher Camp, SCV, set up the seating and tables. The monument was draped and tied with white cotton cloth and the base was festively dressed with red and white bunting.

By 12:30 p.m. the Leesburg courthouse was coming to life as many folks dressed in period clothing began filling the courtyard. At approximately 12:45 p.m., 15 minutes prior to the service start, many dark clouds formed overhead. The cavalry, infantry, color guard, musicians and the wagon filled with the state ladies were all headed towards King Street in the parade march for the kick off. As they walked down King Street, the heavens opened up and the streets of Leesburg were blanketed by sheets of rain, but that did not stop them. You could still hear them coming for two city blocks, as the sounds of Dixie echoed down the streets and alleyways of downtown Leesburg. The first thing in sight was the flagstaff tips pointing upward in a faultless row as if at attention. Following behind them the infantrymen marched in perfect step to the beat of the Loudoun Border Guards drums, while the steady clicking of horse hooves danced on the now wet pavement.

Although the celebration was temporarily halted due to the rain and lightning, the many participants and guests held their ground and proved Southern tenacity still prevailed. As the clouds dissipated, folks reappeared from every direction and the service resumed in all its glory. Ironically, history in a different manner repeated itself: ".....even the intense heat failed to dampen the ardor of the large and enthusiastic assemblage. (Loudoun Mirror - 1908)"

Ladies and gentlemen in period dress once again filled the courtyard while period music provided by Evergreen Shade played harmoniously in the background. Leesburg's former mayor, Jim Clem, took the stage for the "welcome", as Mayor Capt. W.E. Garrett did in 1908, followed by UDC Lee Chapter President, Becky Fleming, with opening remarks. Other highlights were Virginia Division President of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, Susie Masters, who read the names of the real granddaughters, and Harry Shupe who read the names of over 300 Loudoun County soldiers periodically throughout the service. The two guest speakers were Elijah B. White III and Kenneth M. Fleming, Commander of the Clinton Hatcher Camp,

SCV. Elijah B. White III, Rector at the Church of Our Saviour, who is the great-grandson of the famous Col. Elijah V. White of the 35th Battalion, also played a major role in the unveiling as did his grandfather Elijah V. White, in 1908. (Col. White played a major role in the fund-raising, but died before the unveiling). The monument unveiling assistants were Laura Collins Crouse, Charlotte Ruth Byrne Zaback and Malon Jeb Forrest Zaback.

.....The monument was unveiled by Master Elijah V. White assisted by little Misses Hannah Brown McIntosh and Mary Kat Keeler and Master Thos. B. Carruthers. Elijah White was dressed in a gray uniform, with the buttons from the uniform worn by his grandfather, Col. E. V. White in the civil war, and he also had with him Col. White's sword..... Loudoun Mirror 1908

Confederate cotton candy, southern pulled pork BBQ (donated by Downtown Saloon) and Dixie water was provided to all the participants. All in all, the celebration was a grand success and one to remember for a lifetime.

To ensure that Loudoun's residents do not have to search for the monument's history and rededication materials at the 150th celebration in 2058, the Lee Chapter UDC put together a large "time capsule" to include programs, a DVD, photographs, monument history, the ladies' sashes, and monument bunting and unveiling cloth etc. to help with the next generation's commemoration

May the citizens of Loudoun always cherish and care for this monument, as well as the others on the courthouse lawn, erected in memory of Loudoun's own who have served in time of war..
